A Light to Lead Us Home Matthew 1-4: Introduction

There are few parts of the bible more familiar to us than the early chapters of Matthew. Each December, as presents are wrapped and wreaths are hung, we return to the Gospel accounts of the birth of Christ. We hear again of Mary, pledged to be married. We see the Magi, following the star. Like all of our Christmas traditions, these stories have a sentimental aura. The season encourages a spirit of child-like naivety, and in that spirit we remember, again, the birth of Jesus.

Yet to isolate these passages as 'The Christmas Story' can leave us blind to the picture Matthew is painting of "Jesus Christ the son of David, the son of Abraham". These studies offer us a chance to weight these passages without carols ringing in our ears. Matthew crafts his account of the birth of Jesus in deep dependence upon the Old Testament scriptures. More than that, The Gospel of Matthew tells the story of Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection as a continuation and fulfilment of the whole Biblical story.

When we hear this God breathed-history and follow where Matthew leads us new vistas open up. Jesus' identity, his mission and our expected response are presented through a tapestry of Old Testament quotations and allusions. As we take the time to consider these Old Testament echoes, the wonder of God dwelling with us in Christ can be captured again.

Study 1: The Genesis of Jesus

Matthew 1:1-17

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How far back can you trace your genealogy? Anyone interesting back there	e?

Read Matthew 1:1-17

1) What stands out to you? What questions do you have? What names are unfamiliar to you?

2) What are the major structural divisions in the genealogy (cf 1:17)? Why may Matthew have structured the genealogy in such a way?

3)	Within the genealogy there are some anomalies that you would not usually find in such a list. Do any stand out to you?
4)	Consider the 5 women who are included. Who are they? Are they linked in some way? What does the mention of these specific women communicate about Jesus, His mission and the family He was creating?
5)	Jesus' family tree embraces outsiders, and so too should the church that bears his name ("Imagine a church where the broken find a family and the outsider is embraced"). How might the different 'layers' of church be part of the inclusion of outsiders? Consider: Church services, network groups, bible study groups, families and individuals?

6) Consider 1:2 and 1:11, where both Judah and Jeconiah (Jehoiachin) are linked to their brothers. What do these men do to protect their 'brothers' (Genesis 44:33 and 2 Kings 24:12)? How is Matthew pointing to Jesus' mission through this curious mention of 'brothers'?

7) Self-sacrificial love and service is in the 'DNA' of Jesus. We long to be a church where this same self-sacrificial love is part of our 'DNA'. How will you be serving your brothers and sisters in 2020?

8)	Let's take a look at how Matthew begins and ends his Gospel.
•	Matthew begins with the phrase "A record of the genealogy of Jesus Christ". Literally, "The book of the genesis of Jesus Christ". A similar phrase is found 10 times through the book of Genesis (2:4, 5:1, 10:1, 11:10 and so on).

 Matthew ends the Gospel with what is commonly called 'the great commission' (Matthew 28:16-20). Importantly for us, the traditional Jewish ordering of the Old Testament also ends with a great commission. Have a read of 2 Chronicles 36:22-23, the traditional conclusion of the Old Testament scriptures.



Study 2: The Birth of Jesus

Matthew 1:18-25

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Read Matthew 1:18-25

1) What initial thoughts, questions or insights arise from the passage?

2) Consider Matthew 1:18-25 beside Luke 1:26-38. How are they different? How are they similar?

3)	Some people find miracles such as the virgin birth impossible to believe. Is
	belief in such things difficult for you? Have you ever had to defend your
	belief in the miraculous?

- 4) "This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about (Matthew 1:18)". God could have caused the Christ to be born to a happily married husband and wife. God could have caused the Christ to be born to a single woman. God could have formed the Christ from the dust! Yet God chose that it would come about this way.
 - A virgin.
 - Pledged to be married.
 - Found to be with child through the Holy Spirit.

Why this way? What biblical themes lay the groundwork for these curious details and make Jesus' peculiar birth fitting in the big story that leads up to it.

5)	Many religions have mechanisms by which people can balance out their sins and save themselves. How does the miraculous birth of Jesus squash any such ideas creeping into Christianity?
6)	We know little of Joseph beyond what Matthew writes in chapters 1 and
	2. What do we discover about his character from the following verses?

	• 1:24

7)	Justice, mercy and courage. Which of these do you share with Joseph? Which would you love to grow in? How might you begin to grow in these? Are there situations in your life right now where you need to pursue justice with mercy?
8)	Consider the names given to Jesus in these verses. At which points in your life has it been particularly important to know you have a 'saviour' or that 'God is with us'? Who would you love to come to know Jesus in this way?

9)	What meaning did God's promise, quoted in Matthew 1:22-23, have at the time it was first spoken? Have a read of Isaiah 7-9. What would the promise have meant to King Ahaz? What was its fulfilment in Isaiah's time? In what sense can Jesus also be the fulfilment?

Study 3: A light to lead us

Matthew 2:1-12

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Other than God (obviously), what would people close to you say you worship?

Read Matthew 2:1-23

1) What initial thoughts, questions or insights arise from the passage? Are there any parts of the Old Testament of which this passage reminds you?

2)	What is the political tension in verses 2:1-2? Why is Herod and 'all Jerusalem (probably meaning the hierarchy or Jerusalem)' disturbed?
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3)	Herod may be King, yet he is not of the royal Davidic line. Rather, his family are Edomite converts to Judaism.
	• Why might his place on the throne be offensive to many Jewish people (Genesis 49:10, 2 Samuel 7:12-13, Isaiah 16:5, Ezekiel 37:25)?

•	What is the origin of the Edomites (Genesis 25:30)? How does this
	background further colour Herod's claim of the throne?

4) Jesus, we read, is born <u>King</u>. Is this how you think of and pray to Jesus? What impact might it have on our decisions, priorities and interactions with our world to truly live with Jesus as King? How may Jesus being born king colour what it means to have 'faith' or 'trust' in Jesus?

5) When Herod enquires as to where the Christ was to be born, the chief priests, reliant on Micah 5:2, point to Bethlehem, the birthplace of king David. Read Micah 5:1-5. What gospel themes emerge as you consider the verse context?

6) Keeping in mind the Exodus echoes throughout the passage, look again at the Magi, noting the details Matthew gives. Who in the Exodus story do the Magi most remind us (compare Exodus 13:21 & Matt 2:9-10, Exodus 8:1 & 2:11)?

7) Matthew's ironic reversal is to recast the gentile Magi in the role of Israel. Spend some time considering their <u>worship</u>. Who is it directed towards? Of what does their worship consist?

8) We long to be a church where "delight in God overflows into all of life". What may we learn from the Magi's "delight in God"? How may this Christmas season and the New Year provide you an opportunity for a refocus on the worship of Jesus?

Study 4: Vision Feedback Week




WHERE A HUNGER TO KNOW, LOVE AND SERVE CHRIST RENEWS EVERY SEASON



Study 5: New Moses

Matthew 2:13-23

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Read Matthew 2:1-23

1) Last week we saw how Matthew highlights themes from Exodus in his retelling of Jesus' early life. What ironic reversals to the Exodus story happens in 2:13? How should this colour how we view Jerusalem, Herod, the high priests and Jesus' call to 'follow him'?

2) Matthew considers Jesus fleeing Jerusalem as a fulfilment of Hosea 11:1 (Matthew 2:14-15). Read through Hosea 11 together. How does linking Jesus to the 'son' in Hosea 11 give an indication of Christ's identity?

3)	Herod, in true Pharaoh style, orders the death of all boys under 2 in
	Bethlehem. Again, Matthew sees this moment as a fulfilment of prophecy
	and quotes Jeremiah 31:15. Read through Jeremiah 31:1-17 together.
	What themes from Jesus life do you hear in these verses? How does this
	chapter of Jeremiah find fulfilment in Jesus?

4) How does Matthew 2:19-21 continue the Exodus theme (Exodus 4:19-20)? How is Matthew continuing to allude to Jesus identity and mission?

5) Matthew states that Jesus settling in Nazareth is also a fulfilment of Old Testament prophecy. The problem is, the phrase "he will be called a Nazarene" is found nowhere in the Old Testament. What indication does Matthew give that he is not quoting a specific prophet, but rather broader prophetic theme?

6) In these verses we see Jesus beginning to replay Israel's history. As we, Christ's body, live in imitation of him, how might we also replay this history? What parts of Israel's history most resonate with the situation of Miranda Anglican today (think through the stages of Israel's history: Egypt, the wilderness, conquest of the land, the kingdom under David, the decline of the Kingdom, the exile, rebuilding after the exile, waiting for the Messiah)?

7) Alongside explicitly stating Jesus identity (1:1), Matthew expects readers to discover it through the prophecies and narratives of the Old Testament. Deep reading of the Old Testament scriptures is necessary, it seems. What has your bible reading pattern been throughout the year? Has it helped you worship Jesus? What are your reading plans for summer and 2020?



Study 6: New Exodus

Matthew 3:1-17

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Matthew 3:1-17

1) What initial thoughts, questions or insights arise from the passage? Are there any parts of the Old Testament of which this passage reminds you?

2) What is the deal with John's outfit (consider 2 Kings 1:7-8)? What does this communicate to God's people?

3)	What is the deal with John's diet (consider Exodus 10:12 and Exodus 33:3)? What does this communicate to God's people?
4)	What is the deal with John's baptism in the desert (3:1) at the Jordan River (3:5-6)? Consider Joshua 1:2 and Ezekiel 36:24-27? What would this communicate to God's people?
5)	John's baptism marked a significant moment of recommitment. Have you ever had such moments in your Christian life? How may our regular moments of confession at church help us do so each week?

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8) To begin a relationship with Jesus is to experience a baptism of Spirit and fire. We have the new life of the Holy Spirit but it is not without the refining of fire (judgement, suffering and discipline). Has this been the case for you throughout 2019? How would you like Christ to grow and refine you through 2020?

Digging Deeper

9) Consider 2 Kings 2 alongside Matthew 3:1-12. What resonance do you notice between the two parts of scripture? What is the symbolism of the geographical movement of Elijah and Elisha? What is the ironic reversal as John and Jesus recapitulate this moment?

Study 7: The Wilderness

Matthew 3:13-4:11

<u>Talk</u>

For many, the acronym HALT has been helpful in pre-empting and understanding moments of intense temptation. We struggle with temptation most when we are <u>H</u>ungry, <u>A</u>ngry, <u>L</u>onely or <u>T</u>ired. Do you find this to be true?

Read Matthew 3:13-4:11

1) What initial thoughts, questions or insights arise from the passage? Does this passage remind you of any parts of the Old Testament?

2) What reason does Jesus give for submitting to baptism? What do you think this means? How has Matthew used the word 'fulfil' so far? Might this give us a clue as to Jesus' meaning?

3)	Jesus goes through the waters at his baptism and then is led by the Spirit into the desert? What part of Israel's history is being replayed?
4)	Jesus is <u>led</u> by the Spirit into the desert <u>to be tempted by the devil</u> . The purpose of his time in the desert is that He experiences temptation. How does this connect to his mission to 'fulfill all righteousness'?
5)	The bible is quite clear that temptation does not find its origin in God (James 1:13-14). Yet the Bible is equally clear that the trials we face are of great importance if we are to persevere to the end (James 1:2-4). How have periods of trial and testing refined your faith?

6)	Spend some time considering the temptations Jesus faces. How do the temptations escalate in location and power?
7)	What is the rationale behind these particular temptations?

	What gives Jesus the strength to endure temptation? What is the 'armour' he wears into this battle? Are we similarly equipped to face temptation? How are you sharpening your weapons against the devil?

	Consider Deuteronomy 9:7-21 and Matthew 27:32-50. How do each resonate with Matthew 3 and open up insights into Jesus' ministry?
